

Before you start:

- 1. Prayerfully read through the whole lesson at least twice
- 2. Gather all the materials you need for each section (see right)
- 3. Work with another team member and plan who will manage each section of the session.

Leadership Personal Preparation:

What does money mean to you? In what remarkable ways has God taken care of your financial needs over the years? Was someone ever financially generous towards you? What effect did that have in your life? What experiences do you have of being personally blessed after being generous towards others?

If the Holy Spirit invites you to do so, be ready to tell the story of your experience during the welcome or the conclusion. Otherwise use the inspiration of your personal experience to fill you with enthusiasm for today's session.



- Respond by asking God to help them use their financial resources wisely and lovingly

Welcome and Prayer - 5 mins

Say:

Some people say money makes the world go round. That's not exactly true, but money has become a very important part of our culture, our lives and our world.

Money has a strange effect on humans. We want as much money as possible. We strive for better jobs and pay rises, or we long for more pocket money, or our first real job. Some people will do anything to have more money. They will steal, murder, lie... So how do we relate to money as Christians? We need money so we can have a home, food and clothes. But then what? How does God want us to use the money he gives to us?

What does money mean to you? What does it mean to God, and how can God's perspective on money, and the way we use our money, make a powerful difference to our lives and the lives of others? Today we're going to explore some of these important issues.

Icebreaker - 8 mins - choose one of the following activities:

Coin Icebreaker

You will need:

- Mixed foreign coins (at least 2 from each country)
- Attractive, roomy bag to contain the coins
- Collect together some non-valuable foreign coins. It doesn't matter how many coins you have from each country or even if some coins are the same. But you do need to have more than one coin from at least four countries. You can also use coins from your own country if necessary.
- Place the coins in an attractive roomy
- bag so that people can put their hand in the bag and pull out a coin.
- When everyone has a coin ask them to
- find everyone else who has a coin from the same country as theirs.

Card Icebreaker


You will need:

- Currency/country cards (from the resources section)
- Copy enough cards so that you have at least one card per person.
- Cut them apart and stack them with their partners. When you know how many people will be present, count the cards you need, making sure that you have an even number of cards. Ask a team member to stand in if you need to round up the numbers in the group to make an even number.
- Drop the correct amount of cards into a bag and give it a good shake.
- Give each person a card it will be either the name of a coin or the name of a country that uses the coin.
- Invite people to go around the group and find a person who has the country which uses the coin on their card, or a person who has the coin that the country on their card uses for currency.









Mission Possible - 10 mins

You will need:

- 1. Gold foil-wrapped chocolate coins at least 3 per person
- 2. Clear plastic sandwich bags
- Randomly call each person forward and give them a small, clear plastic bag. Some will have several chocolate coins and some will have none.
- See how long it takes for someone to realise that people have been given unequal sums of 'money'.
- Divide the group into two separate groups those who have no coins and those who have coins.
- Ask the 'no coins' group to discuss together what it felt like to have been given no coins at all when they knew that some people had been given several coins.
- Ask the group with the coins to discuss how they want to solve the problem of 'financial inequality'.
- It is important to leave the groups to work out their own plan. Hopefully they will decide to share out all the coins - but there are no guarantees!
- Whatever the outcome, bring the two groups back together and move into the feedback questions.

Feedback Questions:

How did those who were given empty bags feel when they realised that other people had been given coins in their bags?

How did those who were given coins feel when they realised that people had been given different amounts of coins and that some people had no coins at all?

How did the group with the coins decide what to do with them?

What was the result of their choice?

How did everyone feel at the end of the exercise?

Ask people to find a partner and to describe something that they learned from this experience, or how this activity made them feel.

Word Search - 25/35 mins

You will need:

- 1. The supplies as listed on page 1 under the title 'Word Search'
- Ask each pair from the end of the previous Feedback time to find another pair so that they make a group of four people.
- Ask each group to number the people in their group from 1-4, so that each person has a different
- Then form 4 groups of all the 1s, 2s, 3s, and 4s, and ask them to explore the study that corresponds to their group number, so the 1s will explore study 1, etc.
- Allow the groups at least 20 minutes for their study and poster activity.
- Call everyone back to the main group to show the posters they have made of their different thoughts and discoveries.



Family Focus - 15 mins

You will need:

- 1. Drinks and Cups
- 2. Family Discussion Cards
- Let everyone re-assemble into their family groups, collecting a drink on the way.
- Give each family a discussion card.

Praying together - 10 mins

You will need:

- 1. 1 copy of the 'Gift Promise' sheet per family
- Invite each family to partially complete their 'Gift Promise' sheet as each person thinks of interesting ways to spend at least £1 (or local equivalent) to help or bless someone else in some way.
- People do not have to say how much they will give. This is just between them and God.
- Ask each person in the family to pray for guidance about how they should use their money to help someone else in a direct way (i.e. not just putting money in a charity box).
- Encourage each family to complete their promises by the end of the week and to spend time talking together at home about how they used their money.
- Ask them to think about the effect this activity had on them personally, as well as the possible effect of their gift on those who were helped.

Jesus and Me (JAM) session - 5 mins

You will need:

- 1. CD player and CD of soft worship music
- 2. One set of Journal Pages per participant
- Give out the 'Jesus and Me' journal pages for this week.
- Allow at least five minutes for people to make a start on their pages so that they will be encouraged to complete their projects during the week ahead.

Take-away Menu

You will need:


- 1. Tithe envelopes
- Give each person a tithe envelope as a reminder that all of our money comes from God.
- Our tithes are like a thank you card to God for the money he gives to us.
- Our offerings are extra gifts we give because we love him and we want to love other people by sharing our resources with them, too.



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
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
