Women show deep drop in church attendance

New research by the Adelle M. Banks, Religion News Service has discovered that women attending church has dropped dramatically. Women, long considered the dominant pew dwellers in the United State's have shown a dramatic drop in attendance in the last two decades, a new survey shows.

Since 1991, the percentage of women attending church during a typical week has decreased by 11 percentage points to 44 percent, the Barna Group reported. Sunday School and volunteering among women also has diminished. Two decades ago, half of all women read the Bible in a typical week—other than at religious events. Now 40 percent do. The survey also found a marked stepping away from congregations: a 17 percentage increase in the number of women who have become "unchurched"



"For years, many church leaders have understood that 'as go women, so goes the American church', wrote Barna Group founder George Barna, on his website. "Looking at the trends over the past 20 years, and especially those related to the beliefs and behavior of women, you might conclude that things are not going well for conventional Christian churches." The Ventura, Calif.-based researchers compared surveys of more than 1.000 people in 1991 and 2011. They found that the percentage of women who strongly be-

lieve the Bible is accurate in all it teaches declined by 7 percentage points to 42 percent. And those who view God as "the all-knowing, all-powerful and perfect Creator of the universe who still rules the world today" dropped from 80 percent to 70 percent. "Women used to put men to shame in terms of their orthodoxy of belief and the breadth and consistency of their religious behavior," wrote Barna. "No more; the religious gender gap has substantially closed".

Denise Hochstrasser, Women's Ministries Director, Euro-Africa Division in Bern writes: "As the Seventh-day Church consists of more than 73% women, this development is serious. There is an urgent need of nurturing, empowering and outreach to women in churches. Women need to find their own place and task inside our churches, and we need more women in leadership.

An Adventist First: Mother and Daughter Pastors

Indeed, the story of Nancy Chadwick and Christine Chadwick Wallington, who recently graduated together from La Sierra University, is a first. The two are employed by the

Southeastern California Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. Nancy Chadwick serves as associate pastor at the Hemet Adventist Church and her daughter Christine Wallington has just begun a master's degree at the Adventist Theological Seminary at Andrews University.

Since it's beginning, the General Conference Women's Ministries Department Scholarship program has provided funds for 1.748 women to attend college—and the number is constantly

growing. As of the first quarter of 2011, a total of approximately \$767,700 has been raised in the program's 20-year existence.



FUNDING FOR THE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMME

In 2003, members of the General Conference Women's Ministries Scholarship Committee felt distraught over the number of applicants that were being turned down. "There had to be a way to raise more funds," Carolyn Kujawa, a now-retired GC employee who still volunteers said. "These were our sisters."

Now money is raised each year through the royalities from an annual Women's Ministries devotional book, which also is published and sold to raise funds for the scholarships.

They are our inspiration."



Breast Cancer awareness

How common is breast cancer?

Breast cancer is the most prevalent cancer among women and affects approximately one million women worldwide.

Breast cancer accounts for 30 per cent of all female cancers in the UK and approximately 1 in 9 women in the UK will get breast cancer sometime during their life.

What are the risk factors leading to the

development of breast cancer?

The incidence of breast cancer increases with age and doubles every 10 years until the menopause when the rate of increase slows

Approximately a quarter of breast cancers affect women under the age of 50, a half occur between the ages of 50 and 69 and the remaining quarter develop in women who are 70 years or older.

Geographical variations, reproductive factors, age of first pregnancy, inherited risk, previous breast disease, radiation, weight, alcohol intake, hormones, to name but a few

Go to your own countries Breast Cancer page and let's make our sisters aware of the risks. Because the earlier it is diagnosed the better the results.

The good news is that breast cancer survival rates are among the highest of all cancers.
