
Definition

Biblical examples



- Moses: groups of 10 (Exodus 18)
- Jesus: group of 12
- The early church: house groups (Acts 2:42,46)

Group Covenant



Agree on the expectations for the meeting and the relationships between members.

- Meeting day, time, length
- Core values
- The group as a safe place
- Respecting differences and not trying to "fix" anyone
- How to invite new members
- How much time to be spent on each part of the meeting structure
