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DISCIPLESHIP FOR YOUR 10 TO 13-YEAR-OLD

AS PARENTS WHO BELIEVE WE ARE LOVED BY GOD, WE WANT TO DO ALL WE CAN TO HELP OUR CHILDREN RECEIVE THAT SAME LOVE THROUGH A RELATIONSHIP WITH GOD THAT LEADS TO A SPIRIT FILLED LIFE OF SERVICE AND FAITH.

The question is, how do we do this? Research shows that we cannot delegate the important task of mentoring our children towards discipleship. Even at this age, as your children start to become more independent, their greatest influence is still you, their parent.

This pamphlet is a brief guide and idea resource for you as a parent on how to mentor your child as he/she moves towards the teenage years and encounters a variety of cultural voices. At this stage of their life, they are experiencing a greater sense of individuality. This can be complicated. They need your help to navigate these years, and make sense of their faith. Here are some simple aims and ideas that might prove helpful as you and your child meet the challenges of this developmental phase.

Tell them the story of how you became a Christian, your baptism and how you came to be a follower of Jesus, and integrate faith into everyday conversations.

- ENCOURAGE TIME WITH CHRISTIAN FRIENDS
- HELP YOUR CHILD DEVELOP A PERSONAL RELATION-SHIP WITH GOD
- INVOLVE YOUR CHILD IN CHURCH
- DEVELOP A DEEPER UNDER-STANDING OF BIBLE STORIES AND BIBLICAL DOCTRINES

- > Friends are increasingly important at this time, so take initiative to invite church friends over for the weekend.
- Try to have conversations about friendships and the importance of choosing good friends and being a good friend.
- Start a "betweens" group at church, which can meet together for fun, bible study, and service.
- > Help your child achieve time alone with God by helping them make a plan and providing age appropriate resources (i.e. Bible, journal, Sabbath School material).
- Make sure your child witnesses you setting time aside for communication with God.
- Keep up the family traditions family worship and Sabbath activities continue to build faith and identity.
- Show your child that you value their spiritual education by bringing them to Sabbath School.
- > Talk to the church leaders about how your child can be involved in the church.
- Keep reading and telling stories from the Bible, and share what the stories mean to you.
- > Tell your child how the teachings and doctrines of the Bible help you make life decisions.
